2021 sees us in a much stronger position financially. Since reopening, our shops are back recycling second hand goods into first class care. As COVID restrictions are lifting, our fundraising team are planning a calendar of events and activities for everyone. Better times are ahead.

A hospice is so much more than 4 walls – it is all about people. Throughout the pandemic we have never lost focus on what we do best and that is providing vital free care for patients at the hospice and in the community and support for their families.

JON SHARES HIS EXPERIENCE OF KATHARINE HOUSE

"When I was a schoolboy, my Mother died of cancer at home. My father and I had very little support and it was a horrible experience. Then in 1993, (my wife) Gillian's mother died of cancer in a hospice in Wakefield and I remember thinking it would have been great if something like this had been around when my mother was poorly.

Shortly after Gillian's mother passed away, I walked past Katharine House and I decided to drop in and see if they needed any volunteers. I ended up helping in fundraising, I really enjoyed it and I still do all these years later.

Gillian was first diagnosed with cancer in June 2020 and at first the prognosis was positive. However, over the course of the year her situation changed, her cancer was spreading rapidly and we were told in June 2021 that there was nothing more that could be done for her.

At the hospital, the care had been great medically, but it's just a concrete block and it was 24/7 hustle and bustle. When Gillian came to Katharine House, it felt more like a hotel; it was summertime and the doors in her room opened up onto the gardens. The flowers were all in bloom and we would watch the birds

on the birdfeeder and the squirrels would come as well.

Everybody, from the young lad cleaning the sink to the doctors and everyone in between were brilliant. There was a particular nurse Chloe, the day Gillian died, she just sat outside with me on one of the benches for half an hour, it started to rain and she just sat there with me. I don't think we spoke, but I noticed her presence and it made a difference.

After Gillian passed away, I felt that I needed to write a Will and I have made the decision to leave a gift to the hospice. I am doing this mainly because of the care Gillian received, but also because I feel like it is a sequence of events; I started off fundraising, then as life would have it Gillian was cared for by Katharine House and now by leaving a gift in my will I can ensure that Katharine House can carry on caring for other families long after I'm not here.

It costs £6,000 per day to run Katharine House and provide all of our care services free of charge. This year some amazing supporters have managed to fundraise enough to pay for a whole day of care.

Jason Evans and lifelong friend Josie Byford walked the length of Staffordshire in June. They completed the 60 mile walk in 20 hours starting at Harecastle Tunnel in Stoke on Trent and finishing in Kinver near Stourbridge. It was a deeply personal challenge for Jason as his father, John Evans, spent the last few days of his life at the hospice before passing away in 2007.

Jason says "I was so impressed by how they looked after not just my dad, but also my mum and I. The surroundings there are fantastic and the private rooms are huge, so we could fit all

the family in. The nurses were always on call and talked everything through, which is good as you can't prepare yourself for losing a loved one. They help all of the family, which is absolutely incredible. I didn't know the hospice is a charity, I thought it was NHS funded. It gave me a jolt when I found out. That is why we decided to fundraise, every penny helps".

SUMMER FUNDRAISING


This summer we have recommenced our fundraising initiatives starting with our emotional forget me not display, Danceathon and **Cycling Challenge.**

VR SUPPORTS WELLBEING FOR OUR PATIENTS

Patients receiving support from the hospice's
Virtual Well Being Programme were invited
to take part in a 6 week VR trial aiming to
identify the benefits of virtual reality on
mental health and wellbeing. The patients
have been fortunate enough to visit some
exotic locations recently as part of a VR
- virtual reality - project delivered by film
maker Ben Malone of community interest
company Project Vae.

Patients like Mike and Euna can visit places around

the world from the comfort of their armchairs using a virtual reality headset. Each video visits a different location and is completely unique. Ben filmed and presented all of his 360 videos himself. His passion and enthusiasm shone through and has had a real impact on the patient's experience

the patient's experience. Locations visited include Germany's Lake Eibsee and Zugspitze, Thailand's beautiful Phuket, the Big Buddha Temple, fabulous Phi Phi Islands, Glencoe, the Peaks and the Albert Dock.

This project couldn't have come at a better time, after

shielding during the pandemic our patients have had very little to plan for, they have been unable to travel or see family and friends. It has given them something to look forward to, especially as each week they are transported somewhere different, which arouses different emotional responses. Some of the patients have visited the locations before and it has acted as a trip down memory lane, other patients have not visited the locations, but are finding that they are feeling very emotional during the videos.

Ben will be sharing more details of the research once the final analysis is complete and is also in the process of creating a video to conclude the trial with some of the best clips and interviews from the sessions.

CARE REVIEW UPDATE

Following changes to some of our services as a result of the pandemic, the trustees of Katharine House Hospice decided that it was an appropriate time to conduct a review of the care services that we provide. The purpose of this review was to help clarify and shape the hospice's future role within the community.

A vital part of the care review was to gain the thoughts of our supporters and an insight into what you felt was the role of Katharine House. Many of our supporters completed the survey sent by email and we would like to thank you for taking the time to do this, your input is extremely valuable.

Alongside the survey we also ran a series of focus groups, with healthcare professionals and with staff and volunteers, we also issued a survey to all of our staff and volunteers.

The findings of all these engagement activities were shared with Trustees and we are now beginning to formulate proposals for how we should shape our services in the future to provide the best care we can for our community. We will seek further engagement by sharing these proposals with healthcare professionals, our staff and volunteers, patients and families. and also with those supporters who engaged with the first phase of consultation. We hope to submit a strategy to the Board of Trustees for approval before the end of the year We will continue to keep you up to date on any decisions or changes that are going to take place. VOLUNTEERING

Volunteers are vital in the running of Katharine House, we are extremely grateful for all of our volunteers, Peter Coxon shares his experience.

"A little over 2 years ago I was considering voluntary work as a way of repaying Katharine House for the exceptional care, kindness and support that my wife and I had received during the previous 2 years. Lynne (volunteer co-ordinator) asked me if I could do gardening and I agreed to give it a try, although my horticultural experience was limited.

I live within walking distance of the hospice and I have lots of spare time. On my initial venture into the garden, I was able to tidy up the most visible areas with a little weeding, pruning and re-planting of the pots and baskets.

Over that summer, I learned a lot from friendly advice and trial and error, some of the patients love to demonstrate skills, such as deadheading dahlias. Now that the gardens are tidy again, people assume that I am an expert gardener and come to me for advice. I have to explain that they probably know more than I do.

Gardening is a very rewarding pastime for its therapeutic benefits and for the satisfaction of creating something that is pleasing to the eye, but I feel especially privileged to be able to work in the beautiful garden of the special place that is Katharine House Hospice and getting to know the wonderful hospice staff, patients and volunteers.

FOCUS ON... OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

This is Occupational Therapist Shona Tolmie - Fisher with her colleague physiotherapist Ellie Miller. Shona works for the hospice for half a day, every day, with her remaining hours based at County hospital as part of their palliative care team. Occupational Therapy is a service that is provided for patients at Katharine House, both on our in-patient unit and out in the community.

Shona says: "My role is to optimise a patients function and wellbeing. I assess individual needs using a holistic approach, this means that I look at the needs of the whole person, both physically and psychologically, to help manage their symptoms.

I assess an individual's function – including mobility, transfers, personal care, and activities of daily living. I also provide support regarding fatigue management, lifestyle, breathlessness (along with Ellie), anxiety and self-esteem.

On average 92 patients every year receive support from our Occupational & Physiotherapists.



As part of a patient's rehabilitation, Occupational Therapy may include using equipment to compensate for loss of movement, strength and help increase psychological wellbeing. In this photo myself and Ellie were helping to mobilise patient Alan Cooper to establish what he was able to do and provided an appropriate walking aid to enhance his independence.

Personally I really enjoy working at the hospice, it's a privilege to work with fantastic staff and patients in such a supportive environment."
